CHILD GUIDANCE CENTER ANNOUNCES NEW CLINICAL PSYCHOLOGY FELLOW

STAMFORD, CT/March 17, 2008 – The Child Guidance Center of Southern Connecticut (CGC) has announced the one-year appointment of Scott Hutchinson to the Center’s Post-Doctoral Fellowship in Child and Adolescent Psychology. The goal of the fellowship is to provide a varied, high quality training experience that will support post-doctoral students in further development of their clinical skills in working with children, adolescents and their families.

Prior to joining CGC’s post-doctoral program, Scott Hutchinson worked as a psychology intern at the Center. Before that, he completed two psychology externships, spending two years at The Landon School for Boys in Bethesda, Md. and two years at the George Washington University Center Clinic in Washington, D.C. Hutchinson earned a bachelor of science degree in English literature and human and organizational development from Vanderbilt University in Nashville, Tenn. He received a doctoral degree in psychology from George Washington University’s Center of Professional Psychology.

The CGC’s Post-Doctoral Fellowship in Child and Adolescent Psychology offers a unique and personalized teaching program for the next generation of clinical psychologists. Fellows work closely with CGC’s professionals discussing individual cases, planning courses of treatment, attending staff seminars and case conferences as well as conducting community workshops and consultations with other agencies and schools (including Head Start and Pre-School Programs).
